



The River Rat Paddle Challenge

It was a dark and stormy night. The rain was being blown across the terrain in such force it was like standing under a waterfall. WHOOPS, wrong story. Let me begin again.

The day and evening started with an invite from Jack and Marsha Land to spend the night before the race at the Sugar Creek Retreat. By doing this, we would save an hour of travel the morning of the race. So Barbie and I took them up on the invite. The 3rd Annual River Rat Paddle Challenge

We left Sugar Creek and drove to West Monroe and the put in for the race. We got there about 7:15am and already many people were unloading boats. Boats unloaded we returned to TRAPPS [the finish] and took the shuttle bus back to the put-in. There were 104 entrants with very few tandem teams . Lots of boats of every shape and size . A few were there to "race the clock" and others there to just paddle and be part of the event. I should add; the RRPC is a fund raiser for The North East Louisiana Horse Assisted Therapy Program. So back to the race/paddle . For those who were there to really beat the clock, the prize for completing the course (6.5 - 6.7 miles), depending on how you measure it, is an engraved Rat out of Hell Leatherman tool. To get the Leatherman, you must complete the race in under an hour. Now, I don't care who you are, that is hauling the coal. This year there were six men and one fantastic woman who did it.

As for the rest of the group, there were several stand up paddle boarders, a couple of canoes, and kayaks of every shape and size. Many decorated with their team colors . Team Shark Attack had many wearing fins, Red White and Blue had flags and bunting. Kayaking Cowboys wore stetsons and The Memphis Mafia may have had some special dress however, they were so far ahead of the pack I couldn't tell.

The Bayou Chapter had three entrants but we were not a team. Jack and Bar-B were loosely associated with team Shark Attack, I remained independent . There were few if any who wished to associate with me. At the start of the race it was requested that the speedsters line up at the front of the pack. The start was given and before I could see through the water flying off the many paddles they were GONE. The rest of us however were furiously flaying the water and making our slower way down the bayou to the river. As I paddled I could see Jack moving off ahead of Bar-B and myself. He was a man on a mission. Barbie and I were not as speedy and paddled at a more leisurely pace . As the race progressed, my back began to cramp a bit and at the five mile mark I pulled over to the bank and got out and stretched for three or so minuets. Cramp gone I returned to the boat and continued down the river to the finish. I did not better my last year's time, however, the Flyer paddled well. It was the engine that was not up to the task.
