Wayne Kiefer called the meeting to order with 18 in attendance. Guests were recognized.


Treasurer's report: Dick Maxwell reported that we have a balance of \$4,227.15. A check of \$650.00 was given to the Red River Wildlife Refuge for new audio equipment.

last meeting. Motion was approved.

Publicity: No report.



Program: Samantha Luttrell from the Outdoor Wilderness Learning (OWL) Center presented a program about the outdoor therapy that the center does as part of the Louisiana Methodist Children's Home. BCOS will do some trail maintenance at the center on October 11 and 12.

Old Business: We are still on hold for finishing the Lake Bistineau canoe trail signs. The water has been drawn down. Tammy Jernigan will be talking to staff at the park next week. There is water at the trail. The problem is getting to the trail because of the drawdown. We are also looking at placing signs on Dorcheat.

Past events: Moonlight float on the Red River - 10 or 12 attended who saw the event on Facebook. Moonlight float at the Red River Wildlife Refuge. We had to invite the public to this float. All the canoes at the refuge were rented. There were about 50 people on the float with only 6 from BCOS. It was a beautiful sunset.

Upcoming events: Tammy Jernigan reminded us to check the newsletter, BCOS email, and OzarkSociety.net for upcoming activities. The Bodcau Hunting and Fishing Day will be September 28. OWL trail maintenance will be October 11 and 12. The Red River Wildlife Refuge Wildlife Celebration will be October 19. We will be at the beach area to introduce people to paddling. Tammy said that we need suggestions for speakers. Email her with ideas.

Tammy reported that the Louisiana Purchase Cypress Legacy Project is trying to identify the oldest cypress trees in each parish and trees that have been around since the Louisiana Purchase in 1803. We may be able to help identify these trees by having popup paddles in nearby parishes. The oldest cypress in Caddo Parish has not yet been identified.

Jenny Hackman will have a booth at the Bodcau Hunting and Fishing Day about mosquitoes and bite prevention.

Dick Maxwell reported that starting now Ozark Society dues collected will be good through 2020.

Jenny Hackman reported that a few of the old BCOS shirts are still available.

Our next meeting will be October 15.

Bayou Dorcheat Paddle

As many of you know, BCOS has been working with Lake Bistineau State Park on a paddle trail. During this project, we have partnered with the Webster Parish Convention and Visitors Commission working with their executive director Serena Gray. Serena has been a big advocate of our outdoor activities so when she asked for some help exposing other tourism professionals to the outdoors, several BCOS members were glad to help.

We met at the Lumberjack Grill in Sarepta for pre-paddle fueling and then headed to Sikes Ferry Landing at Bayou Dorcheat and Hwy 2. We had four BCOS members, Roy, Barbie, David and Tammy, to show Serena and her eight cohorts the beauty of Dorcheat. Most of the tourism folks had never paddled and had no idea of what to expect. We paddled north on still waters for about 40 minutes until the bayou narrowed and we started seeing some of the large old growth Cypress trees that reside there. After several photo ops, we headed back to the boat ramp. While many spoke of the beauty of Dorcheat and the peacefulness of paddling, the most common statement was "I can't wait to do this again." From the BCOS standpoint, we just say "Mission accomplished!"

Lake Bistineau State Park now has six brand-new kayaks for rent! Tammy is currently working with Tracie on designating paddle trail access during the drawdown. Hopefully we'll have a pop up paddle coming soon!

"Moonlight" Float on Lake Caroline

The evening of Saturday, September 14, 2019 was supposed to be clear, one day after the full moon. So, the Bayou Chapter of the Ozark Society planned a moonlight float on Lake Caroline, the lake in the Red River National Wildlife Refuge, Headquarters Unit. According to Ranger Terri Jacobson at the refuge, the float was to be opened to the public, so it was promoted on social media sites. In addition, the eight tandem canoes at the refuge would be available to reserve for the event.

It was soon apparent that there is considerable local interest in canoeing by people who do not own boats. The eight canoes were quickly reserved, mostly by families who were excited about the opportunity to explore the lake from a paddle boat.

Daytime temperatures on Saturday were in the high-nineties, but that did not deter the eager paddlers who started gathering at the boat ramp at 6:00 pm. Ranger Terri transported the canoes, paddles and PFDs to the site where many hands helped unload the boats and equipment. Dick Maxwell also brought 4 kayaks that are property of the Bayou Chapter. In addition to the 16 people who had reserved the canoes, there were several individuals and families who brought their own boats. Unfortunately, no one remembered to count the paddlers, but Ranger Terri estimated that around 50 people participated. One family was offered the use of a Bayou Chapter kayak to make sure that everyone was outfitted safely.

The plan was to paddle across the lake to the duck banding site, a small sand beach, where we could all gather to eat our snacks and watch the moon rise in the eastern sky. However, it turned out that there was a cloud bank low on the eastern horizon, so the prospect of a visible moonrise seemed iffy. Never-the-less, everyone was excited just to be in a boat on the water.

Some participants preferred to linger on the water and watch the beautiful sunset, then return to the boat ramp. Others, paddled straight across the lake and disembarked on the beach to wait for the moon. Everyone socialized on the beach while keeping a watchful eye on the kids playing in the shallow water. There are alligators living in Lake Caroline, after all.

With the gathering darkness, many people headed back to the boat ramp even before the predicted moonrise time of 8:03 pm. But, there were a few persistent individuals who stayed on or near the beach until around 8:30 pm, hopefully waiting to see the golden orb emerge above the clouds. No such luck. The clouds were too thick. Plus, everyone wearied of slapping at the mosquitos.

As the last boats pulled into the boat ramp, people climbed out of their boats, dragged them up the ramp and loaded them on their vehicles, the moon finally showed herself high in the sky. It was a beautiful sight.

Bayou Chapter members who enjoyed this event were Gary and Jenny Hackman, Dick Maxwell, Larry Moore, Becky Jutze and Sandy Roerig. It was a lovely (cooler) evening, even though the moonrise was late. It was good to have non-member participants who had a good time - perhaps they will consider attending other outings and joining the Ozark Society.
