Meeting

1. At the Bodcau Dam Wildlife and Fisheries Day on September 28, 18 Bayou Chapter members assisted in putting 163 event visitors in canoes or kayaks so they could enjoy a paddling experience.

2. On October 11 and 12, Bayou Chapter members (12 and 16, respectively) performed trail maintenance on several miles of trails at the Outdoor Wilderness Learning Center.

The program was presented by Charles Kirkland on safety in the outdoors. Charles is President and CEO of Solo Wilderness Medicine and has many years of experience as a medic in National Parks, the military and mission trips. His talk focused on preventing, recognizing and treating hyperthermia and hypothermia.

<u>Old Business</u>: Wayne stated that finishing the project of marking the paddle trail in Lake Bistineau is on hold until the lake water rises.

<u>Upcoming Events</u>: Wayne mentioned the Red River National Wildlife Refuge Celebration on October 19, the LOVIT hike in Arkansas on October 26, the Red River Clean-Up on November 2, the All Society meeting in Arkansas on November 8-9, a paddle on the Red River on Veterans Day, November 11, a visit to Chimp Haven on November 16 followed by a hike at Eddie Jones Park and a Duck Pond Clean-up on November 23.

Tom mentioned that Webster Parish has as app for tourism. He asked members to contact him if they see it and the Bayou Chapter is mentioned.

Roy O'Neal mentioned that the chapter needs to have a few child-size PFDs for events in which families use our boats. He estimated they would cost about \$25 each and will do some research on this issue.

New Bayou Chapter member Marshall Kelly announced that the Shreveport Hikers will meet at 6:30 am for a hike at Atlanta State Park, in Texas. All are welcome to participate.

Tom made a motion for the meeting to adjourn. Becky Evans seconded the motion. Motion passed unanimously.

The weekend of October 23rd found a venturesome group of BCOS members and friends enjoying a cool but sunshiny day on the Lake Ouachita Vista Trail (LOVIT) just west of Hot Springs. The preceding day was wet and dreary, with a bit of light rain again on Saturday morning. But the hiking gods were good to us, and the rain stopped just in time for a mid-morning "ascent" on the east side of Bear Mt., near the Brady Mt. Resort. Temps were mid to upper 50s, just perfect for a stroll through the woods.


At our starting point, the trail climbed gradually upward for perhaps a mile or so before transitioning to a fairly straight, slightly undulating path that follows the ridge line of the mountain. It is a cleared, well marked trail that was surprisingly dry, considering rainfall from the day before. To the north side, we were treated to beautiful views of Lake Ouachita that could be glimpsed when there were breaks in the trees. As the morning progressed, we naturally clustered into a few smaller groups, as folks moved along at their own pace. The stretch of trail we were on was 10 miles from point-to-point, and runs east to west. None of us felt that adventurous on this particular Saturday, so we all hiked in as far as we wanted before returning to our start point. The day was topped off with a little lagniappe when Wayne and Robyn invited us to join them for eagle spotting lakeside at Mt. Brady Resort, where they had seen several on Friday. We didn't see any in flight, but spotted several from a distance that were nesting. Dean and Vickie, along with the two Ks (Kathe and Kathy), didn't have their fill Saturday, so they returned to the trail for a shorter hike on Sunday. They had the same starting point as Saturday, but hiked east up Brady Mt., instead of west up Bear Mt. Their report was that Brady Mt. may have been the prettier of the two sections.

As is typical of BCOS outings, the day was as much about sharing the adventure with friends as it was about being on the trail. There was the usual 'catching up' with those we haven't seen for a while, and lots of laughter. Kathy Kramer was outing leader and did all the leg work to organize the trip and coordinate with everyone. BCOS members who joined us were Grace and Steve Eyler, Brenda and Rick Miller, Ann Holbrook, Vickie Rech, Robyn Gillies, and Wayne Kiefer. It was a special treat to also have with us long-time friends and former BCOS members Kathe and Dean Miller (from Kilgore) and Cindy Fuller (still teaching at Henderson State College in Arkadelphia). One aspect of the outing that was NOT typical for a BCOS hike was the absence of a campfire, as no one was tent camping. Many in the group were enjoying overnight stays with others in the group that live locally, while two in the group found lodging at Brady Mt. Resort. Ann and Cindy may day trips to be with us.

For those of you who may be interested but were not able to join us, this is an easy trail within a reasonable drive within about a 3 ½ hour drive of Shreveport. (TRAVEL TIP: I had a really good pulled-pork sandwich at Bubba's Brew House, about 6 or 7 miles west of Pearcy on Hwy. 70.)

Kathy and I hope to return to this section of the LOVIT and make the 10 mile jaunt all the way across Bear Mountain to see what we missed on this trip, and there are other sections of the trail for us yet to explore. So stay tuned for future outings. We'd love to have you join us.





Ozark Society General Membership Meeting November 9, 2019

The Ozark Society general membership met on Saturday, November 9 at the lodge in Queen Willhelmina State Park, AR. Sandy Roerig represented the Bayou Chapter. President David Peterson opened the meeting at 3:00 pm.

Tom Perry, President of the host Highlands Chapter, welcomed everyone and described the schedule for the weekend.

Ross Noland, Director of the Buffalo River Foundation, described a 40 acre property that the Foundation wishes to purchase. It is on Whiteley Creek and is bordered on two sides by the Buffalo River National Park. Nearly all the funds required to purchase the land have been acquired.

Luke Parsch provided a comprehensive discussion of proposed changes in the Ozark Society bylaws that had been approved at the August Board meeting. These changes are for Bylaws 10, 3 and 4 and mainly serve to match the current practices of the Society, clarify membership categories and establish duties for the officers. There was little discussion and the changes were unanimously approved by the members present.

David discussed an update of the C&H hog farm issue. Overall, the Ozark Society has spent around \$95,000 to support the shut-down of this operation. The State of Arkansas recently refused to renew the permit of the farm to operate. The final piglet has now been born on the farm and the workers are in the process of closing down the operation. The Ozark Society needs to remain vigilant on making sure adequate monitoring of soil and water is performed.

There was a discussion on protecting Arkansas Wilderness/Special Interest areas. Of special concern is the Blue Hole area which is supposed to be roadless but now has multiple roads that are being overused by ATVs.

Chris Klein, Community Engagement Chair, (Highlands Chapter) gave a report on the Young Naturalist program that she initiated in the fall of 2018 in the Fayetteville area. She developed partnership with the University of Arkansas, Master Naturalists and the local Audubon Society. This program, targeting 7-9 year-old children has been very successful in attracting participants. Chris is happy to help other chapters that may want to start a similar program in their area.

David announced that the Neil Compton Awards will be awarded to Bob Cross and to Bill and Dana Stewart. He described the contributions of these long-time members to the missions of the Ozark Society.

David stated that Fred Paillet's new book *Forest Forensics* is selling well. So far, 155 copies of the original 300 copies printed have been sold.

Carolyn Sherman, Communications/ Membership Chair, provided a report on the membership. There are currently around 900 members, distributed about 50/50 between annual members and life members. She needs articles for the next issue of the *Pack and Paddle*.

David recognized Janet Parsch, President of the Ozark Society Foundation Board, whose 10-year and 6 month term on the Board has ended. He thanked her for all her excellent work on the Board. Janet then gave an update on the OS Foundation Board. The current Board members are Ken Leonard and Marvin Schwartz, who are co-chairs, and Rex Robbins. At least two additional Board members are desired. The Foundation is considering publishing an updated revision of the trees book. The Foundation administers both the scholarships, the Neil Compton Scholarship (\$5,300 per student) and the Hedges Scholarship (\$5,000 per student).

David announced that there will be a Colorado trip this year and information will be available on the Ozark Society webpage. The Salmon River rafting trip is full.

Laura Timby volunteered the Buffalo River Chapter to host the spring general membership meeting.

Red River National Wildlife Refuge Celebration

Members of the Bayou Chapter of the Ozark Society once again assisted in the annual celebration at RRNWR, held on October 19, 2019. It was a beautiful, warm, sunny day as members gathered around 8:30 am on the duck banding site - the small sand beach across Lake Caroline from the Visitors Center. The water at this site is shallow and somewhat clear, so is an ideal site for launching canoes and kayaks.

Dick Maxwell brought the Bayou Chapter kayaks and there was a trailer load of canoes plus paddles and personal flotation devices (PFDs) that are property of RRNWR already on site. Roy O'Neal, Marian Howard, Gary Hackman, Ken Harris, Stephanie Parks, Wayne Kiefer, Ann Gibson and Sandy Roerig unloaded the boats, set up a canopy, table and chairs, and were ready to assist people who wanted a paddle experience. Larry Moore and Becky Jutze brought their own kayaks and provided the essential safety boats.

Before long, people attending the celebration started arriving, usually via the golf cart shuttle vehicle. At first, there were only two or three at a time, but as the day went on, entire families with multiple children eagerly arrived.

First, participants were required to sign a waiver, then they were fitted with PFDs. What often followed was a discussion/negotiation on which boats the parents would allow their kids to paddle. The kids usually wanted to go out by themselves in a solo kayak, but some parents thought a parent should be in a tandem canoe with a child. In other cases, the kids were a bit reluctant, and the parent encouraged him/her to try paddling alone. Compromises were made and Bayou Chapter members provided basic instructions on how to safely enter a boat and handle a paddle. Then boats were then launched and the adventures began.

There was no time limit on how long people could stay out on the water and some eager paddlers did explore the lake for a long while. Others were content to just paddle out a bit, and come back, happy that they hadn't tipped over. The most fun was seeing all the big smiles on paddler's faces as they beached their boats at the end of their trip. Even those who were a bit hesitant at first, soon gained enough boat control that they were comfortable on the water and having a great time. Overall, 87 celebration visitors had a chance to experience a paddle sport. Most of them promised they would be back next year.

The celebration was scheduled to end at 2:00 pm, so paddlers were rounded up and boats were reloaded on the trailers, canopy taken down and paddles and PFDs reorganized. A lunch had been provided by the RRNWR, which members enjoyed in-between helping the paddlers.

Overall, it was a fun day to be outdoors, fulfilling two missions of the Ozark Society, education and recreation. We'll do it again next year!









Bodcau Pop Up Paddle

It appeared that Sunday, October 20, was to be the last super warm day of the year. What a great day to embark on a pop up paddle on a shaded swamp with cool water!

Tammy Jernigan, Wayne Kiefer and Matthew Grusler met up at the Bodcau boat launch to go in search of old growth Cypress trees. Most trees in this area are in the 100-200 year old range due to logging that took place from 1880 to 1930. Tammy relayed her recently gained knowledge on how to spot 200+ year old trees - sometimes size can be deceptive. We located several 400+ trees and the famed Zack Bursen tree (shown below) which is 700-800 years old. This old tree has a cypress knee nearby which is over six feet tall! It was identified and plaqued by the Louisiana Purchase Cypress Legacy Project in 2008. Our paddle lasted about two hours and was the perfect way to end a nice weekend.





Update on Lake Bistineau Paddle Trail

The SBCTD showed their appreciation by sharing their lunch with us and providing a donation of ten youth sized PFDs. We also have a mechanism now to post our public events to their website.


