

Caddo Lake National Wildlife Refuge

We had a good group join us for an orientation of the Caddo Lake National Wildlife Refuge on Saturday January 25, 2020. We had a total of 23 BCOS members, Facebook guests, Friends of the CLNWR and Texas Master Naturalists in attendance. Our trail guide was Becky Gullette, Master Naturalist and Friend of the CLNWR.

Hikers via carpool, caravan or personal vehicle met at the Refuge Visitor Center just outside of Karnack, Texas at 10:00am. It was a short 32-mile drive from the North Market Brookshires to the refuge.

We explored the refuge via several trails starting with the Magazine Trail. This hike began with a short history lesson of the old ammunition plant and a wandering around old buildings and structures. The Magazine Trail was a short trail with lots of flora and a jaunt along a creekside. We then drove to the Starr Ranch Trail for a hike and saw where a new kayak launch would be built. There is great access to Caddo Lake here and it would make a fun paddle to Johnson's Ranch, the oldest inland marina in the state of Texas. We then hiked the Hope Cemetery Trail where a recent storm had done quite a bit of damage to the fence and headstones. All of these short trails combined gave us a pretty good workout. There was also a lot of interesting and informative interpretive signage at the refuge about not only history but the flora and fauna as well. All total we meandered around for about 2.5 hours and 4.5 miles.

We can definitely see more opportunities in the future to make plans to go back. Caddo Lake State park is right down the road for camping opportunities. There are 50 miles of roads to ride bicycles as well as access to Caddo Lake to paddle kayaks and several good hiking trails.

Eddie D. Jones Park Hike

After several days of overcast skies and intermittent rain, Saturday February 1, 2020 dawned bright, cool and clear – just perfect hiking weather. This change was good news for the 13 hikers who met at Eddie D. Jones Park around 9:00 am, ready for a walk in the woods. Members of the Bayou Chapter of the Ozark Society and their guests comprised the group. After introductions, a quick safety briefing and a few stretches, the group started out at the trail head near the parking lot. Sandy Roerig led the pace for this merry band, with Marian Howard serving in the sweep position. Almost immediately, one individual decided that this adventure was not for him, and quickly dropped behind Marian, and back to his car. Undeterred, the rest of the group continued down the trail.

The recent rains had left the trail a bit slippery in some areas and a few spots still had actual puddles, but there were no real impassable places. This trail is used often by bicyclists and does not follow a straight line between two points, Rather, it winds around, following the geography of this hilly, wooded area. And, because of the many trees (mixed hardwoods and conifers), there are lots of roots across the trail, making it important to keep one's eyes almost constantly fixed on the ground in order to avoid tripping. These factors were no problem for this intrepid group as it tackled the 8 mile loop marked by red signs. The green signs indicated short cuts and a shorter route, but no one wimped out on this beautiful day.

There was an orienteering meet going on at the same time as the BCOS hike and occasionally, we saw young people running off-trail, through the trees, racing to find the stations marked on the maps they frequently consulted. At one point, we also met a runner on the trail, likely training for a future running event.

At around the 4 mile mark, when the trail merged briefly with a horse trail, we enjoyed a short break and a snack. But, because there were no good places to sit down (such as downed trees or sitting rocks), the rest stop was just a chance to visit or answer a call of nature. Just after the 6.5 mile marker, there was a long bridge over a stream that drains a small lake, then a short distance through an open field. The trail then merged again with the horse trail between two lakes before heading back into the woods.

When the group reached the 8 mile marker, a decision was made to take the green trail, which led right back to the parking lot by the trail head. The red trail continues for another 3 miles or so, but everyone was ready to finish for this day.

Back at the parking lot, we enjoyed sitting for a bit, eating lunch and just relaxing before the drive home. BCOS participants included Wayne Kiefer, Anne Gibson and grandson Alex, Rebecca Evans, Dee Jay Teutsch, Barbie Halbert, Kim Cox and Chuck Flores, as well as several guests. It was a lovely day to be outside enjoying the Louisiana 'winter'. Hope you can join us next time!
