




#### **Sunday Morning Hike at the Monkey Trail**

#### A Tip of the Hat from the Forest Service (and . . . maybe . . . a historical marker for the ABF trail)

The community of Big Fork (population: 179 or so) is nestled in a valley on Highway 8, southeast of Mena. It sits less than two miles from the northern most point of the Athens-Big Fork Trail (ABF). On November 1st of last year, a small group of interested folks gathered at the Big Fork Community Center to explore possibilities for an official marker that would recognize the significance of historical trends of the West-Central Arkansas area that are embodied in the history of the Trail itself. Roy O'Neal joined me in representing BCOS. David Samuel, Retired Forest ranger from Joplin, Arkansas, was also present. Representing the Ouachita National Forest were Bill Jackson (Acting Ranger for Caddo-Womble District) and Tom Ledbetter (Trails Coordinator). Others in attendance included Dr. Revis Edmonds (Reasearch Historian for the Division of Arkansas Heritage), Joe Jacobs (Editor, Arkansas Outside), Stacey Shaver-Matson (Race Director for the ABF Marathon and President of the Arkansas Ultra Runners Association), a companion AURA member (who's name I regretfully do not recall), and Big Fork's Volunteer Fire Chief (who heated up the Center on a very chilly 25 degree morning!).

The meeting began with my PowerPoint presentation of the information David and I have amassed regarding the history of the ABF, and underscored how the history of the Trail is a direct reflection of several hundred years of history in the West-Central Arkansas area. Following this presentation, Dr. Edmonds shared information regarding three possible historical designations for the Trail, qualifying criteria for each of the three designations, and the role of his Office in making final determinations on applications for historical designation. His review indicated the Trail would not qualify for two of the three types of designation, but could be considered for designation by a historical marker. An application to the State for such a marker presents some challenges, and prospects for success are uncertain at present. However, there is strong interest in pursuing this, so David and I (supported by interested parties and local historical societies) will explore this further and see if the challenges can be met. I'll certainly keep our Chapter members posted on developments.

The meeting also included a presentation of a Certificate to the Bayou Chapter "In appreciation of our organization's trail maintenance support of the Athens-Big Fork Trail". Roy proudly accepted on behalf of all BCOS members. (He was not asked to make a speech, and I'm not sure how he feels about that.) But as Ranger Jackson noted in his brief remarks, the Ouachita National Forest does not have adequate staff to maintain existing trails, and relies heavily on volunteers to help out. I'm sure almost all of our BCOS members are aware of our Chapter's long-standing tradition of work on the ABF. It's a great privilege to care for this

special gift Mother Nature has given us, and an appropriate way to honor our Chapter's crucial role in restoring the Trail and opening it up for the use of so many who trek there every year to enjoy outdoor recreation. Our ongoing work in maintaining the Trail is a legacy to be proud of, and I hope we'll continue doing just that for years to come.
